BRRTS Numbers: 03-16-000067 and 03-16-222878

QUESTION: Why was the 1986 BRRTS number (03-16-000067) used on the bid document when that number has been closed, and the verbiage states that the 1999 BRRTS number (03-16-222878) is the subject of this bid? It seems like that would cause confusion, and perhaps potential problems later.

ANSWER: BRRTS number 03-16-000067 is still an open case. The questioner might be confusing this case with BRRTS number 04-16-207772, which was assigned to a 1991 gasoline spill at this same property. The Department of Natural Resources closed the spill case in September 2005. Both LUST sites on the subject property (03-16-000067 and 03-16-222878) are referenced in the bid document because both cases are still open, and monitoring wells associated with 03-16-000067 will be utilized in the site investigation of 03-16-222878.

QUESTION: It looks like at least 3 of the 4 requested direct push boring locations are very similar to three of the requested monitoring well boring locations. Is there any problem with taking soil samples from the monitoring well borings and maybe installing one additional hollow stem boring during the well installation to define the soil plume, or is the well location contingent upon soil data from the geoprobes? This wasn't specifically stated that way.

ANSWER: The bid document does not specify that the additional soil sampling be conducted through direct push borings. The direct push borings discussed in the bid document were installed previously, and are referenced for location purposes only. It was assumed that the winning bidder would utilize hollow stem auger borings to collect the required soil samples concurrent with the installation of the required monitoring wells, thereby completing the field work in one mobilization.
