F. Presentation and Consideration of the Heroes for Healthcare Proposed Military Medics and Corpsmen Program



Background

- Over 200,00 military service members annually separate from the military. Healthcare holds
 promise as a target industry with jobs for service members with healthcare training and
 experience. However, their military healthcare training and hands-on patient experience
 does not easily translate into comparable certification/licenses required in civilian
 healthcare.
- This is most evident in healthcare roles where state licenses are required to practice, such as RN, and other clinical care practitioners.

 As a result, many veterans and service members are left unemployed, underemployed, or leave the healthcare field altogether.





Wisconsin Healthcare Workforce

 The Wisconsin Hospital Association 2019 & 2020 Healthcare Workforce Reports documented the shortages of healthcare workers in Wisconsin.

During the height of the surge of COVID-19, Wisconsin hospitals experienced shortages of:

- Nurses
- Nursing Assistants
- Respiratory Therapists

Factors:

- Wisconsin aging population has steadily increased over the past 10 years. This means
 increased demand for hospital and health system services. The baby boomers in healthcare
 are retiring faster than they can be replaced.
- The vacancy rates in healthcare dropped below double digits in 2019: Entry-level positions such as nursing assistants, practical nurses and technicians made up all but one of the top five highest vacancy rates in 2019.
- Advanced practice nurses remained in the top-five again in 2020.
- COVID-19 increased the impact of these existing shortages.

Wisconsin Military Medics & Corpsmen (Wis-MAC) Program

The Wis-MAC program is a pathway for returning veteran clinical care providers and practitioners to work in their field under supervision while they obtain appropriate education and licensure in the State of Wisconsin.

Benefits of Wis-MAC Program

- Wisconsin healthcare systems have access to a pipeline of highly skilled, and motivated service members and veterans eager to apply their military medical experience and education in civilian healthcare.
- This program will help address workforce shortages in entry and mid-level healthcare positions.
- When passed, Wisconsin will be just the second state in the country to offer this pathway.
 This will make Wisconsin attractive for service members and veterans with military healthcare experience from all over the United States.
- The veterans hired in healthcare, with the assistance of the Wis-MAC program will directly contribute to the state and local tax base, economy, and in communities where they live.
- The program will increase the diversity of patient care practitioners.





Wisconsin Military Medics & Corpsmen Program Eligibility

Wis-MAC Qualified Pathway

- Army Medics, Navy/Marine/Coast Guard Corpsmen, and Air Force Aerospace Medical Technicians 12 months pre/post-discharge.
- ➤ Honorable/Generally Discharged
- Able to perform clinical skills under the supervision of a physician, registered nurse, podiatrist, or advance practice nurse prescriber.
- ➤ Wis-MAC applicants agree to a timeline to complete credential through the State of Wisconsin or license requirements.
- May practice clinical skills without civilian credentials, under supervision.
- > Veterans & service members hired by Partner Healthcare systems.
- No Veteran Behind Pathway
- Healthcare Leadership Pathway





Wis-MAC Healthcare System Partnerships

- The program will establish partnerships with hospitals in all regions of the state, federally qualified community health centers, tribal health centers, and veteran homes to participate in the Wis-MAC program.
- The program will provide an additional solution to some of their staffing needs, reduce recruitment costs and hiring cycle time.
- The program will make direct referrals of employment-ready veterans who meet partner healthcare organizations job qualifications.
- The Wisconsin Military Medics & Corpsmen Program will foster a new awareness and appreciation of veterans and what they offer the healthcare workforce.





Wis-MAC Planning

Wis-MAC Roundtable

- The thirty-three member Roundtable is comprised of volunteer representatives from healthcare organizations, veterans service organizations, higher education and healthcare associations.
- Created four task groups to review the Virginia MMAC program model and to develop and recommend the program elements for the Wisconsin Military Medics & Corpsmen program.

PRELIMINARY DRAFT - NOT READY FOR INTRODUCTION

AN ACT to amend 441.06 (4) and 448.61; and to create 440.077, 448.03 (2) (bm)
and 448.40 (1m) of the statutes; relating to: practice of certain skilled health
services by military medical personnel and granting rule-making authority.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill allows certain persons who have recently served as an army medic, a navy or coast guard corpsman, or an air force aerospace medical technician in the U.S. armed forces to practice certain skilled health services as part of a program facilitated by the Department of Safety and Professional Services without having to obtain a license. Under current law, with some exceptions, no person may engage in the practice of medicine and surgery without first receiving a license from the Medical Examining Board. This bill directs DSPS, in collaboration with the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Medical Examining Board, and the Board of Nursing, to establish a program in which military medical personnel may temporarily practice certain skilled health services in an inpatient or outpatient health care facility under the direction of a physician, podiatrist, registered professional nurse, or advanced practice nurse prescriber without having to obtain a license from the Medical Examining Board, the Podiatry Affiliated Credentialing Board, or the Board of Nursing.

In order to participate in the program, the military medical personnel must establish a timeline with his or her employer or supervisor under which the military medical personnel will act to acquire a license from the Medical Examining Board, the Podiatry Affiliated Credentialing Board, or the Board of Nursing. The bill provides, however, that the timeline may be extended if unforeseen circumstances

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cause the military medical personnel to need more time to acquire a license. "Military medical personnel" is defined in the bill as a person who has served as an army medic, a navy or coast guard corpsman, or an air force aerospace medical technician in the U.S. armed forces and who was discharged or released from such service in the previous 12 months under honorable or general conditions.

For further information see the state fiscal estimate, which will be printed as an appendix to this bill.

The people of the state of Wisconsin, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. 440.077 of the statutes is created to read:

440.077 Military medical personnel program. (1) In this section:

- (a) "Advanced practice nurse prescriber" means an advanced practice nurse prescriber certified under s. 441.16 (2).
- (b) "Disease" means any pain, injury, deformity, physical or mental illness, or departure from complete health or the proper condition of the human body or any of its parts.
 - (c) "Inpatient health care facility" has the meaning in s. 50.135 (1).
- (d) "Military medical personnel" means a person who has served as an army medic, a navy or coast guard corpsman, or an air force aerospace medical technician in the U.S. armed forces and who was discharged or released from such service in the previous 12 months under honorable or general conditions.
 - (e) "Podiatrist" has the meaning in s. 448.60 (3).
- (f) "Registered professional nurse" means a registered nurse who is licensed under ch. 441 or who holds a multistate license, as defined in s. 441.51 (2) (h), issued in a party state, as defined in s. 441.51 (2) (k).
 - $\left(g\right)$ 1. "Skilled health services" means any of the following:

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- a. To examine into the fact, condition, or cause of human health or disease, or to treat, operate, prescribe, or advise for the same, by any means or instrumentality.
- b. To apply principles or techniques of medical sciences in the diagnosis or prevention of any of the conditions in subd. 1. a. and par. (b).
 - c. To penetrate, pierce, or sever the tissues of a human being.
- d. To offer, undertake, attempt, or hold oneself out in any manner as able to do any of the acts described in this paragraph.
- 2. "Skilled health services" does not include surgical procedures or issuing prescription orders.
- (2) The department, in collaboration with the department of veterans affairs, the medical examining board, and the board of nursing, shall establish a program in which military medical personnel may temporarily perform certain skilled health services while supervised in an inpatient or outpatient health care facility by a physician, podiatrist, registered professional nurse, or advanced practice nurse prescriber without having to obtain a license under s. 441.06, 448.04, or 448.61. Such allowed activities shall reflect the level of training and experience of the military medical personnel. Under the program, a participating military medical personnel shall be supervised by a physician, podiatrist, registered professional nurse, or advanced practice nurse prescriber. The supervising physician, podiatrist, registered professional nurse, or advanced practice nurse prescriber shall retain responsibility for the care of the patient.
- (3) (a) In order to participate in the program under sub. (2), a military medical personnel shall establish a timeline with his or her employer or supervisor that describes the actions the military medical personnel intends to take to acquire a license under s. 441.06, 448.04, or 448.61, including the date by which the military

- medical personnel agrees to acquire the license. The military medical personnel shall submit the timeline to the department on a form provided by the department.
- (b) A military medical personnel becomes ineligible to participate in the program under sub. (2) beginning on the day after the date that the military medical personnel agreed to acquire a license under par. (a).
- (c) The timeline to acquire a license under par. (a) may not be longer than is reasonably necessary considering the license the military medical personnel intends to acquire, his or her education and experience, and any other relevant factors.
- (d) The medical examining board may extend the timeline under par. (a) if it appears that, because of unforeseen circumstances, the applicant requires more time to receive a license under s. 441.06, 448.04, or 448.61.
- (4) The medical examining board shall oversee the operations of the program under sub. (2).

SECTION 2. 441.06 (4) of the statutes is amended to read:

441.06 (4) Except as provided in -s. ss. 257.03 and 440.077, no person may practice or attempt to practice professional nursing, nor use the title, letters, or anything else to indicate that he or she is a registered or professional nurse unless he or she is licensed under this section. Except as provided in -s. ss. 257.03 and 440.077, no person not so licensed may use in connection with his or her nursing employment or vocation any title or anything else to indicate that he or she is a trained, certified or graduate nurse. This subsection does not apply to any registered nurse who holds a multistate license, as defined in s. 441.51 (2) (h), issued by a jurisdiction, other than this state, that has adopted the enhanced nurse licensure compact under s. 441.51.

Section 3. 448.03 (2) (bm) of the statutes is created to read:

12	"Dr.", "D.S.C.", "D.P.M.", "foot doctor", "foot specialist" or any other title, letters or
13	designation which represents or may tend to represent the person as a podiatrist
14	unless the person is licensed under this subchapter.


