## 2021 ASSEMBLY BILL 410

June 25, 2021 - Introduced by Representatives VANDERMEER, MOSES, CABRAL-GUEVARA, BILLINGS, BRANDTJEN, DALLMAN, DOYLE, KNODL, MURSAU, NOVAK, OLDENBURG, PRONSCHINSKE, ROZAR, SPIROS, SUBECK, TAUCHEN, THIESFELDT, WICHGERS, SHELTON and TUSLER, cosponsored by Senators BALLWEG, COWLES, FELZKOWSKI, MARKLEIN, NASS, L. TAYLOR and PFAFF. Referred to Committee on Regulatory Licensing Reform.

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### ***Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau***

This bill ratifies and enters Wisconsin into the Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact (compact), which provides for the ability of an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant licensed in one member state (licensee) to obtain a “compact privilege” to practice in a remote state without obtaining a license in that remote state. Significant provisions of the compact include:

1. The creation of a Occupational Therapy Compact Commission (commission), which includes one member or representative of the licensure boards of each member

state. The compact grants various powers and duties to the commission, including overseeing the administration of the compact, enforcing the compact, adopting bylaws, promulgating binding rules for the compact, establishing an executive committee, and employing officers and employees. The commission may levy on and collect an annual assessment from each member state or impose fees on other parties to cover the cost of the operations and activities of the commission and its staff.

2. A process whereby a licensee may obtain a compact privilege to practice in another member state. A licensee's primary state of residence is considered to be his or her home state, and any other member state in which the licensee seeks to practice is considered a remote state. A licensee providing occupational therapy in a remote state under a compact privilege is subject to that state's regulatory authority. A remote state may take action against a licensee's compact privilege in the remote state, and the licensee is then not eligible for a compact privilege in any state until certain criteria are met. If a licensee's compact privilege in any remote state is removed, the individual may lose his or her compact privilege in any remote state until certain criteria are met. However, a home state has the exclusive power to impose adverse action against a license issued by the home state. If a home state license is encumbered (i.e., suspended), the licensee's compact privilege in any remote state is deactivated until all encumbrances have been removed from the home state license. Member states may charge a fee for granting a compact privilege and may impose a jurisprudence requirement for granting a compact privilege that assesses an individual's knowledge of the laws and rules governing the practice of occupational therapy in a particular state.

3. The ability for member boards to conduct joint investigations of licensees and the ability of member states to issue subpoenas that are enforceable in other states.

4. The creation of a coordinated database and reporting system containing licensure, adverse action, and investigative information on all licensed individuals in member states. A member state must submit a uniform data set to the data system on all individuals to whom this compact is applicable as required by the rules of the commission.

5. Various provisions regarding resolutions of disputes between the commission and member states and between member and nonmember states, including a process for termination of a state's membership in the compact if the state defaults on its obligations under the compact.

The compact becomes effective in this state upon enactment of the bill or upon enactment of the compact in ten states, whichever occurs later. The compact provides that it may be amended upon enactment of an amendment by all member states. A state may withdraw from the compact by repealing the statute authorizing the compact, but the compact provides that a withdrawal does not take effect until six months after the effective date of that repeal.

15 **448.987 Occupational therapy licensure compact. (1) PURPOSE.** The  
16 purpose of this compact is to facilitate interstate practice of occupational therapy  
17 with the goal of improving public access to occupational therapy services. The  
18 practice of occupational therapy occurs in the state where the patient/client is located  
19 at the time of the patient/client encounter. The compact preserves the regulatory  
20 authority of states to protect public health and safety through the current system of  
21 state licensure. This compact is designed to achieve the following objectives:

22 (a) Increase public access to occupational therapy services by providing for the  
23 mutual recognition of other member state licenses;

24 (b) Enhance the states' ability to protect the public's health and safety;

1 (c) Encourage the cooperation of member states in regulating multi-state  
2 occupational therapy practice;

3 (d) Support spouses of relocating military members;

4 (e) Enhance the exchange of licensure, investigative, and disciplinary  
5 information between member states;

6 (f) Allow a remote state to hold a provider of services with a compact privilege  
7 in that state accountable to that state's practice standards; and

8 (g) Facilitate the use of telehealth technology in order to increase access to  
9 occupational therapy services.

10 **(2) DEFINITIONS.** As used in this compact, and except as otherwise provided, the  
11 following definitions shall apply:

12 (a) "Active duty military" means full-time duty status in the active uniformed  
13 service of the United States, including members of the National Guard and Reserve  
14 on active duty orders pursuant to 10 USC ch. 1209 and 10 USC ch. 1211.

15 (b) "Adverse action" means any administrative, civil, equitable, or criminal  
16 action permitted by a state's laws which is imposed by a licensing board or other  
17 authority against an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant,  
18 including actions against an individual's license or compact privilege such as  
19 censure, revocation, suspension, probation, monitoring of the licensee, or restriction  
20 on the licensee's practice.

21 (c) "Alternative program" means a non-disciplinary monitoring process  
22 approved by an occupational therapy licensing board.

23 (d) "Compact privilege" means the authorization, which is equivalent to a  
24 license, granted by a remote state to allow a licensee from another member state to  
25 practice as an occupational therapist or practice as a occupational therapy assistant

1 in the remote state under its laws and rules. The practice of occupational therapy  
2 occurs in the member state where the patient/client is located at the time of the  
3 patient/client encounter.

4 (e) “Continuing competence/education” means a requirement, as a condition of  
5 license renewal, to provide evidence of participation in, and/or completion of,  
6 educational and professional activities relevant to practice or area of work.

7 (f) “Current significant investigative information” means investigative  
8 information that a licensing board, after an inquiry or investigation that includes  
9 notification and an opportunity for the occupational therapist or occupational  
10 therapy assistant to respond, if required by state law, has reason to believe is not  
11 groundless and, if proved true, would indicate more than a minor infraction.

12 (g) “Data system” means a repository of information about licensees, including  
13 but not limited to license status, investigative information, compact privileges, and  
14 adverse actions.

15 (h) “Encumbered License” means a license in which an adverse action restricts  
16 the practice of occupational therapy by the licensee or said adverse action has been  
17 reported to the National Practitioners Data Bank (NPDB).

18 (i) “Executive committee” means a group of directors elected or appointed to act  
19 on behalf of, and within the powers granted to them by, the commission.

20 (j) “Home state” means the member state that is the licensee’s primary state  
21 of residence.

22 (k) “Impaired practitioner” means individuals whose professional practice is  
23 adversely affected by substance abuse, addiction, or other health-related conditions.

1 (L) "Investigative information" means information, records, and/or documents  
2 received or generated by an occupational therapy licensing board pursuant to an  
3 investigation.

4 (m) "Jurisprudence requirement" means the assessment of an individual's  
5 knowledge of the laws and rules governing the practice of occupational therapy in a  
6 state.

7 (n) "Licensee" means an individual who currently holds an authorization from  
8 the state to practice as an occupational therapist or as an occupational therapy  
9 assistant.

10 (o) "Member state" means a state that has enacted the compact.

11 (p) "Occupational therapist" means an individual who is licensed by a state to  
12 practice occupational therapy.

13 (q) "Occupational therapy assistant" means an individual who is licensed by  
14 a state to assist in the practice of occupational therapy.

15 (r) "Occupational therapy," "occupational therapy practice," and the "practice  
16 of occupational therapy" mean the care and services provided by an occupational  
17 therapist or an occupational therapy assistant as set forth in the member state's  
18 statutes and regulations.

19 (s) "Occupational therapy compact commission" or "commission" means the  
20 national administrative body whose membership consists of all states that have  
21 enacted the compact.

22 (t) "Occupational therapy licensing board" or "licensing board" means the  
23 agency of a state that is authorized to license and regulate occupational therapists  
24 and occupational therapy assistants.

1 (u) "Primary state of residence" means the state (also known as the home state)  
2 in which an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who is not  
3 active duty military declares a primary residence for legal purposes as verified by:  
4 driver's license, federal income tax return, lease, deed, mortgage, or voter  
5 registration or other verifying documentation as further defined by commission  
6 rules.

7 (v) "Remote state" means a member state other than the home state, where a  
8 licensee is exercising or seeking to exercise the compact privilege.

9 (w) "Rule" means a regulation promulgated by the commission that has the  
10 force of law.

11 (x) "State" means any state, commonwealth, district, or territory of the United  
12 States of America that regulates the practice of occupational therapy.

13 (y) "Single-state license" means an occupational therapist or occupational  
14 therapy assistant license issued by a member state that authorizes practice only  
15 within the issuing state and does not include a compact privilege in any other  
16 member state.

17 (z) "Telehealth" means the application of telecommunication technology to  
18 deliver occupational therapy services for assessment, intervention and/or  
19 consultation.

20 **(3) STATE PARTICIPATION IN THE COMPACT.** (a) To participate in the compact, a  
21 member state shall:

- 22 1. License occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants;
- 23 2. Participate fully in the commission's data system, including but not limited  
24 to using the commission's unique identifier as defined in rules of the commission;

1           3. Have a mechanism in place for receiving and investigating complaints about  
2 licensees;

3           4. Notify the commission, in compliance with the terms of the compact and  
4 rules, of any adverse action or the availability of investigative information regarding  
5 a licensee;

6           5. Implement or utilize procedures for considering the criminal history records  
7 of applicants for an initial compact privilege. These procedures shall include the  
8 submission of fingerprints or other biometric-based information by applicants for  
9 the purpose of obtaining an applicant's criminal history record information from the  
10 federal bureau of investigation and the agency responsible for retaining that state's  
11 criminal records;

12           a. A member state shall, within a time frame established by the commission,  
13 require a criminal background check for a licensee seeking/applying for a compact  
14 privilege whose primary state of residence is that member state, by receiving the  
15 results of the federal bureau of investigation criminal record search, and shall use  
16 the results in making licensure decisions.

17           b. Communication between a member state, the commission or among member  
18 states regarding the verification of eligibility for licensure through the compact shall  
19 not include any information received from the federal bureau of investigation  
20 relating to a federal criminal records check performed by a member state under P.L.  
21 92-544.

22           6. Comply with the rules of the commission;

23           7. Utilize only a recognized national examination as a requirement for  
24 licensure pursuant to the rules of the commission; and

3           (b) A member state shall grant the compact privilege to a licensee holding a  
4 valid unencumbered license in another member state in accordance with the terms

7           (d) A member state shall provide for the state's delegate to attend all  
8 occupational therapy compact commission meetings.

9           (e) Individuals not residing in a member state shall continue to be able to apply  
10 for a member state's single-state license as provided under the laws of each member  
11 state. However, the single-state license granted to these individuals shall not be  
12 recognized as granting the compact privilege in any other member state.

13           (f) Nothing in this compact shall affect the requirements established by a  
14 member state for the issuance of a single-state license.

15           **(4) COMPACT PRIVILEGE.** (a) To exercise the compact privilege under the terms  
16 and provisions of the compact, the licensee shall:

17           1. Hold a license in the home state;

18           2. Have a valid United States social security number or national practitioner  
19 identification number;

20           3. Have no encumbrance on any state license;

21           4. Be eligible for a compact privilege in any member state in accordance with  
22 pars. (d), (f), (g), and (h);

23           5. Have paid all fines and completed all requirements resulting from any  
24 adverse action against any license or compact privilege, and 2 years have elapsed  
25 from the date of such completion;

1           6. Notify the commission that the licensee is seeking the compact privilege  
2 within a remote state(s);

3           7. Pay any applicable fees, including any state fee, for the compact privilege;

4           8. Complete a criminal background check in accordance with sub. (3) (a) 5.;

5           a. The licensee shall be responsible for the payment of any fee associated with  
6 the completion of a criminal background check.

7           9. Meet any jurisprudence requirements established by the remote state(s) in  
8 which the licensee is seeking a compact privilege; and

9           10. Report to the commission adverse action taken by any non-member state  
10 within 30 days from the date the adverse action is taken.

11           (b) The compact privilege is valid until the expiration date of the home state  
12 license. The licensee must comply with the requirements of par. (a) to maintain the  
13 compact privilege in the remote state.

14           (c) A licensee providing occupational therapy in a remote state under the  
15 compact privilege shall function within the laws and regulations of the remote state.

16           (d) Occupational therapy assistants practicing in a remote state shall be  
17 supervised by an occupational therapist licensed or holding a compact privilege in  
18 that remote state.

19           (e) A licensee providing occupational therapy in a remote state is subject to that  
20 state's regulatory authority. A remote state may, in accordance with due process and  
21 that state's laws, remove a licensee's compact privilege in the remote state for a  
22 specific period of time, impose fines, and/or take any other necessary actions to  
23 protect the health and safety of its citizens. The licensee may be ineligible for a  
24 compact privilege in any state until the specific time for removal has passed and all  
25 fines are paid.

1 (f) If a home state license is encumbered, the licensee shall lose the compact  
2 privilege in any remote state until the following occur:

3 1. The home state license is no longer encumbered; and

4 2. Two years have elapsed from the date on which the home state license is no  
5 longer encumbered in accordance with subd. 1.

6 (g) Once an encumbered license in the home state is restored to good standing,  
7 the licensee must meet the requirements of par. (a) to obtain a compact privilege in  
8 any remote state.

9 (h) If a licensee's compact privilege in any remote state is removed, the  
10 individual may lose the compact privilege in any other remote state until the  
11 following occur:

12 1. The specific period of time for which the compact privilege was removed has  
13 ended;

14 2. All fines have been paid and all conditions have been met;

15 3. Two years have elapsed from the date of completing requirements under  
16 subds. 1. and 2; and

17 4. The compact privileges are reinstated by the commission and the compact  
18 data system is updated to reflect reinstatement.

19 (i) If a licensee's compact privilege in any remote state is removed due to an  
20 erroneous charge, privileges shall be restored through the compact data system.

21 (j) Once the requirements of par. (h) have been met, the license must meet the  
22 requirements in par. (a) to obtain a compact privilege in a remote state.

23 **(5) OBTAINING A NEW HOME STATE LICENSE BY VIRTUE OF COMPACT PRIVILEGE. (a)**

24 An occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant may hold a home state

1 license, which allows for compact privileges in member states, in only one member  
2 state at a time.

3 (b) If an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant changes  
4 primary state of residence by moving between two member states:

5 1. The occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant shall file an  
6 application for obtaining a new home state license by virtue of a compact privilege,  
7 pay all applicable fees, and notify the current and new home state in accordance with  
8 applicable rules adopted by the commission.

9 2. Upon receipt of an application for obtaining a new home state license by  
10 virtue of compact privilege, the new home state shall verify that the occupational  
11 therapist or occupational therapy assistant meets the pertinent criteria outlined in  
12 sub. (4) via the data system, without need for primary source verification except for:

13 a. An FBI fingerprint based criminal background check if not previously  
14 performed or updated pursuant to applicable rules adopted by the commission in  
15 accordance with P.L. 92-544;

16 b. Other criminal background check as required by the new home state; and

17 c. Submission of any requisite jurisprudence requirements of the new home  
18 state.

19 3. The former home state shall convert the former home state license into a  
20 compact privilege once the new home state has activated the new home state license  
21 in accordance with applicable rules adopted by the commission.

22 4. Notwithstanding any other provision of this compact, if the occupational  
23 therapist or occupational therapy assistant cannot meet the criteria in sub. (4), the  
24 new home state shall apply its requirements for issuing a new single-state license.

1           5. The occupational therapist or the occupational therapy assistant shall pay  
2 all applicable fees to the new home state in order to be issued a new home state  
3 license.

4           (c) If an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant changes  
5 primary state of residence by moving from a member state to a non-member state,  
6 or from a non-member state to a member state, the state criteria shall apply for  
7 issuance of a single-state license in the new state.

8           (d) Nothing in this compact shall interfere with a licensee's ability to hold a  
9 single-state license in multiple states; however, for the purposes of this compact, a  
10 licensee shall have only one home state license.

11           (e) Nothing in this compact shall affect the requirements established by a  
12 member state for the issuance of a single-state license.

13           **(6) ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY PERSONNEL OR THEIR SPOUSES.** (a) Active duty military  
14 personnel, or their spouses, shall designate a home state where the individual has  
15 a current license in good standing. The individual may retain the home state  
16 designation during the period the service member is on active duty. Subsequent to  
17 designating a home state, the individual shall only change their home state through  
18 application for licensure in the new state or through the process described in sub. (5).

19           **(7) ADVERSE ACTIONS.** (a) A home state shall have exclusive power to impose  
20 adverse action against an occupational therapist's or occupational therapy  
21 assistant's license issued by the home state.

22           (b) In addition to the other powers conferred by state law, a remote state shall  
23 have the authority, in accordance with existing state due process law, to:

24           1. Take adverse action against an occupational therapist's or occupational  
25 therapy assistant's compact privilege within that member state.

1           2. Issue subpoenas for both hearings and investigations that require the  
2 attendance and testimony of witnesses as well as the production of evidence.  
3 Subpoenas issued by a licensing board in a member state for the attendance and  
4 testimony of witnesses or the production of evidence from another member state  
5 shall be enforced in the latter state by any court of competent jurisdiction, according  
6 to the practice and procedure of that court applicable to subpoenas issued in  
7 proceedings pending before it. The issuing authority shall pay any witness fees,  
8 travel expenses, mileage, and other fees required by the service statutes of the state  
9 in which the witnesses or evidence are located.

10           (c) For purposes of taking adverse action, the home state shall give the same  
11 priority and effect to reported conduct received from a member state as it would if  
12 the conduct had occurred within the home state. In so doing, the home state shall  
13 apply its own state laws to determine appropriate action.

14           (d) The home state shall complete any pending investigations of an  
15 occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who changes primary state  
16 of residence during the course of the investigations. The home state, where the  
17 investigations were initiated, shall also have the authority to take appropriate  
18 action(s) and shall promptly report the conclusions of the investigations to the OT  
19 compact commission data system. The occupational therapy compact commission  
20 data system administrator shall promptly notify the new home state of any adverse  
21 actions.

22           (e) A member state, if otherwise permitted by state law, may recover from the  
23 affected occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant the costs of  
24 investigations and disposition of cases resulting from any adverse action taken  
25 against that occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant.

1 (f) A member state may take adverse action based on the factual findings of the  
2 remote state, provided that the member state follows its own procedures for taking  
3 the adverse action.

4 (g) *Joint investigations.* 1. In addition to the authority granted to a member  
5 state by its respective state occupational therapy laws and regulations or other  
6 applicable state law, any member state may participate with other member states  
7 in joint investigations of licensees.

8 2. Member states shall share any investigative, litigation, or compliance  
9 materials in furtherance of any joint or individual investigation initiated under the  
10 compact.

11 (h) If an adverse action is taken by the home state against an occupational  
12 therapist's or occupational therapy assistant's license, the occupational therapist's  
13 or occupational therapy assistant's compact privilege in all other member states  
14 shall be deactivated until all encumbrances have been removed from the state  
15 license. All home state disciplinary orders that impose adverse action against an  
16 occupational therapist's or occupational therapy assistant's license shall include a  
17 statement that the occupational therapist's or occupational therapy assistant's  
18 compact privilege is deactivated in all member states during the pendency of the  
19 order.

20 (i) If a member state takes adverse action, it shall promptly notify the  
21 administrator of the data system. The administrator of the data system shall  
22 promptly notify the home state of any adverse actions by remote states.

23 (j) Nothing in this compact shall override a member state's decision that  
24 participation in an alternative program may be used in lieu of adverse action.

1           **(8) ESTABLISHMENT OF THE OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY COMPACT COMMISSION.** (a) The  
2 compact member states hereby create and establish a joint public agency known as  
3 the occupational therapy compact commission:

4           1. The commission is an instrumentality of the compact states.

5           2. Venue is proper and judicial proceedings by or against the commission shall  
6 be brought solely and exclusively in a court of competent jurisdiction where the  
7 principal office of the commission is located. The commission may waive venue and

9 dispute resolution proceedings.

10          3. Nothing in this compact shall be construed to be a waiver of sovereign

12          **(b) Membership, voting, and meetings.** 1. Each member state shall have and  
13 be limited to one delegate selected by that member state's licensing board.

14          2. The delegate shall be either:

15           a. A current member of the licensing board, who is an occupational therapist,  
16 occupational therapy assistant, or public member; or

17           b. An administrator of the licensing board.

18          3. Any delegate may be removed or suspended from office as provided by the  
19 law of the state from which the delegate is appointed.

20          4. The member state board shall fill any vacancy occurring in the commission  
21 within 90 days.

22          5. Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote with regard to the promulgation  
23 of rules and creation of bylaws and shall otherwise have an opportunity to participate  
24 in the business and affairs of the commission. A delegate shall vote in person or by

1 such other means as provided in the bylaws. The bylaws may provide for delegates'  
2 participation in meetings by telephone or other means of communication.

3 6. The commission shall meet at least once during each calendar year.  
4 Additional meetings shall be held as set forth in the bylaws.

5 7. The commission shall establish by rule a term of office for delegates.

6 (c) The commission shall have the following powers and duties:

7 1. Establish a code of ethics for the commission;

8 2. Establish the fiscal year of the commission;

9 3. Establish bylaws;

10 4. Maintain its financial records in accordance with the bylaws;

11 5. Meet and take such actions as are consistent with the provisions of this  
12 compact and the bylaws;

13 6. Promulgate uniform rules to facilitate and coordinate implementation and  
14 administration of this compact. The rules shall have the force and effect of law and  
15 shall be binding in all member states;

16 7. Bring and prosecute legal proceedings or actions in the name of the  
17 commission, provided that the standing of any state occupational therapy licensing  
18 board to sue or be sued under applicable law shall not be affected;

19 8. Purchase and maintain insurance and bonds;

20 9. Borrow, accept, or contract for services of personnel, including, but not  
21 limited to, employees of a member state.

22 10. Hire employees, elect or appoint officers, fix compensation, define duties,  
23 grant such individuals appropriate authority to carry out the purposes of the  
24 compact, and establish the commission's personnel policies and programs relating

1 to conflicts of interest, qualifications of personnel, and other related personnel  
2 matters;

3 11. Accept any and all appropriate donations and grants of money, equipment,  
4 supplies, materials and services, and receive, utilize and dispose of the same;  
5 provided that at all times the commission shall avoid any appearance of impropriety  
6 and/or conflict of interest;

7 12. Lease, purchase, accept appropriate gifts or donations of, or otherwise own,  
8 hold, improve or use, any property, real, personal or mixed; provided that at all times  
9 the commission shall avoid any appearance of impropriety;

10 13. Sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchange, abandon, or otherwise  
11 dispose of any property real, personal, or mixed;

12 14. Establish a budget and make expenditures;

13 15. Borrow money;

14 16. Appoint committees, including standing committees composed of members,  
15 state regulators, state legislators or their representatives, and consumer  
16 representatives, and such other interested persons as may be designated in this  
17 compact and the bylaws;

18 17. Provide and receive information from, and cooperate with, law enforcement  
19 agencies;

20 18. Establish and elect an executive committee; and

21 19. Perform such other functions as may be necessary or appropriate to achieve  
22 the purposes of this compact consistent with the state regulation of occupational  
23 therapy licensure and practice.

24 (d) *The executive committee.* The executive committee shall have the power to  
25 act on behalf of the commission according to the terms of this compact.

- 1           1. The executive committee shall be composed of 9 members:
- 2           a. Seven voting members who are elected by the commission from the current
- 3 membership of the commission;
- 4           b. One ex-officio, nonvoting member from a recognized national occupational
- 5 therapy professional association; and
- 6           c. One ex-officio, nonvoting member from a recognized national occupational
- 7 therapy certification organization;
- 8           2. The ex-officio members will be selected by their respective organizations.
- 9           3. The commission may remove any member of the executive committee as
- 10 provided in bylaws.
- 11           4. The executive committee shall meet at least annually.
- 12           5. The executive committee shall have the following duties and responsibilities:
- 13           a. Recommend to the entire commission changes to the rules or bylaws, changes
- 14 to this compact legislation, fees paid by compact member states such as annual dues,
- 15 and any commission compact fee charged to licensees for the compact privilege;
- 16           b. Ensure compact administration services are appropriately provided,
- 17 contractual or otherwise;
- 18           c. Prepare and recommend the budget;
- 19           d. Maintain financial records on behalf of the commission;
- 20           e. Monitor compact compliance of member states and provide compliance
- 21 reports to the commission;
- 22           f. Establish additional committees as necessary; and
- 23           g. Perform other duties as provided in rules or bylaws.

1 (e) 1. All meetings shall be open to the public, and public notice of meetings  
2 shall be given in the same manner as required under the rulemaking provisions in  
3 sub. (10).

4 2. The commission or the executive committee or other committees of the  
5 commission may convene in a closed, non-public meeting if the commission or  
6 executive committee or other committees of the commission must discuss:

7 a. Non-compliance of a member state with its obligations under the compact;

8 b. The employment, compensation, discipline or other matters, practices or  
9 procedures related to specific employees, or other matters related to the  
10 commission's internal personnel practices and procedures;

11 c. Current, threatened, or reasonably anticipated litigation;

12 d. Negotiation of contracts for the purchase, lease, or sale of goods, services, or  
13 real estate;

14 e. Accusing any person of a crime or formally censuring any person;

15 f. Disclosure of trade secrets or commercial or financial information that is  
16 privileged or confidential;

17 g. Disclosure of information of a personal nature where disclosure would  
18 constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;

19 h. Disclosure of investigative records compiled for law enforcement purposes;

20 i. Disclosure of information related to any investigative reports prepared by or  
21 on behalf of or for use of the commission or other committee charged with  
22 responsibility of investigation or determination of compliance issues pursuant to the  
23 compact; or

24 j. Matters specifically exempted from disclosure by federal or member state  
25 statute.

1           3. If a meeting, or portion of a meeting, is closed pursuant to this provision, the  
2           commission's legal counsel or designee shall certify that the meeting may be closed  
3           and shall reference each relevant exempting provision.

4           4. The commission shall keep minutes that fully and clearly describe all  
5           matters discussed in a meeting and shall provide a full and accurate summary of  
6           actions taken, and the reasons therefore, including a description of the views  
7           expressed. All documents considered in connection with an action shall be identified  
8           in such minutes. All minutes and documents of a closed meeting shall remain under  
9           seal, subject to release by a majority vote of the commission or order of a court of  
10          competent jurisdiction.

11          (f) *Financing of the commission.* 1. The commission shall pay, or provide for  
12          the payment of, the reasonable expenses of its establishment, organization, and  
13          ongoing activities.

14          2. The commission may accept any and all appropriate revenue sources,  
15          donations, and grants of money, equipment, supplies, materials, and services.

16          3. The commission may levy on and collect an annual assessment from each  
17          member state or impose fees on other parties to cover the cost of the operations and  
18          activities of the commission and its staff, which must be in a total amount sufficient  
19          to cover its annual budget as approved by the commission each year for which  
20          revenue is not provided by other sources. The aggregate annual assessment amount  
21          shall be allocated based upon a formula to be determined by the commission, which  
22          shall promulgate a rule binding upon all member states.

23          4. The commission shall not incur obligations of any kind prior to securing the  
24          funds adequate to meet the same; nor shall the commission pledge the credit of any  
25          of the member states, except by and with the authority of the member state.

1           5. The commission shall keep accurate accounts of all receipts and  
2 disbursements. The receipts and disbursements of the commission shall be subject  
3 to the audit and accounting procedures established under its bylaws. However, all

5 yearly by a certified or licensed public accountant, and the report of the audit shall  
6 be included in and become part of the annual report of the commission.

7           (g) *Qualified immunity, defense, and indemnification.* 1. The members,  
8 officers, executive director, employees and representatives of the commission shall  
9 be immune from suit and liability, either personally or in their official capacity, for  
10 any claim for damage to or loss of property or personal injury or other civil liability  
11 caused by or arising out of any actual or alleged act, error or omission that occurred,  
12 or that the person against whom the claim is made had a reasonable basis for  
13 believing occurred within the scope of commission employment, duties or  
14 responsibilities; provided that nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to  
15 protect any such person from suit and/or liability for any damage, loss, injury, or  
16 liability caused by the intentional or willful or wanton misconduct of that person.

17           2. The commission shall defend any member, officer, executive director,  
18 employee, or representative of the commission in any civil action seeking to impose  
19 liability arising out of any actual or alleged act, error, or omission that occurred  
20 within the scope of commission employment, duties, or responsibilities, or that the  
21 person against whom the claim is made had a reasonable basis for believing occurred  
22 within the scope of commission employment, duties, or responsibilities; provided  
23 that nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit that person from retaining his or  
24 her own counsel; and provided further that the actual or alleged act, error, or

1 omission did not result from that person's intentional or willful or wanton  
2 misconduct.

3 3. The commission shall indemnify and hold harmless any member, officer,  
4 executive director, employee, or representative of the commission for the amount of  
5 any settlement or judgment obtained against that person arising out of any actual  
6 or alleged act, error or omission that occurred within the scope of commission  
7 employment, duties, or responsibilities, or that such person had a reasonable basis  
8 for believing occurred within the scope of commission employment, duties, or  
9 responsibilities, provided that the actual or alleged act, error, or omission did not  
10 result from the intentional or willful or wanton misconduct of that person.

11 **(9) DATA SYSTEM.** (a) The commission shall provide for the development,  
12 maintenance, and utilization of a coordinated database and reporting system  
13 containing licensure, adverse action, and investigative information on all licensed  
14 individuals in member states.

15 (b) A member state shall submit a uniform data set to the data system on all  
16 individuals to whom this compact is applicable (utilizing a unique identifier) as  
17 required by the rules of the commission, including:

- 18 1. Identifying information;
- 19 2. Licensure data;
- 20 3. Adverse actions against a license or compact privilege;
- 21 4. Non-confidential information related to alternative program participation;
- 22 5. Any denial of application for licensure, and the reason(s) for such denial;
- 23 6. Other information that may facilitate the administration of this compact, as  
24 determined by the rules of the commission; and
- 25 7. Current significant investigative information.

1           (c) Current significant investigative information and other investigative  
2 information pertaining to a licensee in any member state will only be available to  
3 other member states.

4           (d) The commission shall promptly notify all member states of any adverse  
5 action taken against a licensee or an individual applying for a license. Adverse action  
6 information pertaining to a licensee in any member state will be available to any  
7 other member state.

8           (e) Member states contributing information to the data system may designate  
9 information that may not be shared with the public without the express permission  
10 of the contributing state.

11           (f) Any information submitted to the data system that is subsequently required  
12 to be expunged by the laws of the member state contributing the information shall  
13 be removed from the data system.

14           **(10) RULEMAKING.** (a) The commission shall exercise its rulemaking powers  
15 pursuant to the criteria set forth in this subsection and the rules adopted thereunder.  
16 Rules and amendments shall become binding as of the date specified in each rule or  
17 amendment.

18           (b) The commission shall promulgate reasonable rules in order to effectively  
19 and efficiently achieve the purposes of the compact. Notwithstanding the foregoing,  
20 in the event the commission exercises its rulemaking authority in a manner that is  
21 beyond the scope of the purposes of the compact, or the powers granted hereunder,  
22 then such an action by the commission shall be invalid and have no force and effect.

23           (c) If a majority of the legislatures of the member states rejects a rule, by  
24 enactment of a statute or resolution in the same manner used to adopt the compact

1 within 4 years of the date of adoption of the rule, then such rule shall have no further  
2 force and effect in any member state.

3 (d) Rules or amendments to the rules shall be adopted at a regular or special  
4 meeting of the commission.

5 (e) Prior to promulgation and adoption of a final rule or rules by the  
6 commission, and at least 30 days in advance of the meeting at which the rule will be  
7 considered and voted upon, the commission shall file a notice of proposed  
8 rulemaking:

- 9 1. On the website of the commission or other publicly accessible platform; and
- 10 2. On the website of each member state occupational therapy licensing board  
11 or other publicly accessible platform or the publication in which each state would  
12 otherwise publish proposed rules;

13 (f) The notice of proposed rulemaking shall include:

- 14 1. The proposed time, date, and location of the meeting in which the rule will  
15 be considered and voted upon;
- 16 2. The text of the proposed rule or amendment and the reason for the proposed  
17 rule;
- 18 3. A request for comments on the proposed rule from any interested person; and
- 19 4. The manner in which interested persons may submit notice to the  
20 commission of their intention to attend the public hearing and any written  
21 comments.

22 (g) Prior to adoption of a proposed rule, the commission shall allow persons to  
23 submit written data, facts, opinions, and arguments, which shall be made available  
24 to the public.

1 (h) The commission shall grant an opportunity for a public hearing before it  
2 adopts a rule or amendment if a hearing is requested by:

- 3 1. At least 25 persons;
- 4 2. A state or federal governmental subdivision or agency; or

6 (i) If a hearing is held on the proposed rule or amendment, the commission shall  
7 publish the place, time, and date of the scheduled public hearing. If the hearing is  
8 held via electronic means, the commission shall publish the mechanism for access  
9 to the electronic hearing.

10 1. All persons wishing to be heard at the hearing shall notify the executive  
11 director of the commission or other designated member in writing of their desire to  
12 appear and testify at the hearing not less than 5 business days before the scheduled  
13 date of the hearing.

14 2. Hearings shall be conducted in a manner providing each person who wishes  
15 to comment a fair and reasonable opportunity to comment orally or in writing.

16 3. All hearings will be recorded. A copy of the recording will be made available  
17 on request.

18 4. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed as requiring a separate hearing  
19 on each rule. Rules may be grouped for the convenience of the commission at  
20 hearings required by this subsection.

21 (j) Following the scheduled hearing date, or by the close of business on the  
22 scheduled hearing date if the hearing was not held, the commission shall consider  
23 all written and oral comments received.

1 (k) If no written notice of intent to attend the public hearing by interested  
2 parties is received, the commission may proceed with promulgation of the proposed  
3 rule without a public hearing.

4 (L) The commission shall, by majority vote of all members, take final action on  
5 the proposed rule and shall determine the effective date of the rule, if any, based on  
6 the rulemaking record and the full text of the rule.

7 (m) Upon determination that an emergency exists, the commission may  
8 consider and adopt an emergency rule without prior notice, opportunity for  
9 comment, or hearing, provided that the usual rulemaking procedures provided in the  
10 compact and in this subsection shall be retroactively applied to the rule as soon as

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### ***Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau***

This bill ratifies and enters Wisconsin into the Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact (compact), which provides for the ability of an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant licensed in one member state (licensee) to obtain a “compact privilege” to practice in a remote state without obtaining a license in that remote state. Significant provisions of the compact include:

1. The creation of a Occupational Therapy Compact Commission (commission), which includes one member or representative of the licensure boards of each member

state. The compact grants various powers and duties to the commission, including overseeing the administration of the compact, enforcing the compact, adopting bylaws, promulgating binding rules for the compact, establishing an executive committee, and employing officers and employees. The commission may levy on and collect an annual assessment from each member state or impose fees on other parties to cover the cost of the operations and activities of the commission and its staff.

2. A process whereby a licensee may obtain a compact privilege to practice in another member state. A licensee's primary state of residence is considered to be his or her home state, and any other member state in which the licensee seeks to practice is considered a remote state. A licensee providing occupational therapy in a remote state under a compact privilege is subject to that state's regulatory authority. A remote state may take action against a licensee's compact privilege in the remote state, and the licensee is then not eligible for a compact privilege in any state until certain criteria are met. If a licensee's compact privilege in any remote state is removed, the individual may lose his or her compact privilege in any remote state until certain criteria are met. However, a home state has the exclusive power to impose adverse action against a license issued by the home state. If a home state license is encumbered (i.e., suspended), the licensee's compact privilege in any remote state is deactivated until all encumbrances have been removed from the home state license. Member states may charge a fee for granting a compact privilege and may impose a jurisprudence requirement for granting a compact privilege that assesses an individual's knowledge of the laws and rules governing the practice of occupational therapy in a particular state.

3. The ability for member boards to conduct joint investigations of licensees and the ability of member states to issue subpoenas that are enforceable in other states.

4. The creation of a coordinated database and reporting system containing licensure, adverse action, and investigative information on all licensed individuals in member states. A member state must submit a uniform data set to the data system on all individuals to whom this compact is applicable as required by the rules of the commission.

5. Various provisions regarding resolutions of disputes between the commission and member states and between member and nonmember states, including a process for termination of a state's membership in the compact if the state defaults on its obligations under the compact.

The compact becomes effective in this state upon enactment of the bill or upon enactment of the compact in ten states, whichever occurs later. The compact provides that it may be amended upon enactment of an amendment by all member states. A state may withdraw from the compact by repealing the statute authorizing the compact, but the compact provides that a withdrawal does not take effect until six months after the effective date of that repeal.

15 **448.987 Occupational therapy licensure compact. (1) PURPOSE.** The  
16 purpose of this compact is to facilitate interstate practice of occupational therapy  
17 with the goal of improving public access to occupational therapy services. The  
18 practice of occupational therapy occurs in the state where the patient/client is located  
19 at the time of the patient/client encounter. The compact preserves the regulatory  
20 authority of states to protect public health and safety through the current system of  
21 state licensure. This compact is designed to achieve the following objectives:

22 (a) Increase public access to occupational therapy services by providing for the  
23 mutual recognition of other member state licenses;

24 (b) Enhance the states' ability to protect the public's health and safety;

1 (c) Encourage the cooperation of member states in regulating multi-state

8 (g) Facilitate the use of telehealth technology in order to increase access to

4 (e) “Continuing competence/education” means a requirement, as a condition of

7 (f) “Current significant investigative information” means investigative  
8 information that a licensing board, after an inquiry or investigation that includes

11 groundless and, if proved true, would indicate more than a minor infraction.

12 (g) “Data system” means a repository of information about licensees, including

7 pay all applicable fees, and notify the current and new home state in accordance with

13           **(6) ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY PERSONNEL OR THEIR SPOUSES.** (a) Active duty military

7 12. Lease, purchase, accept appropriate gifts or donations of, or otherwise own,

8 b. The employment, compensation, discipline or other matters, practices or

12 d. Negotiation of contracts for the purchase, lease, or sale of goods, services, or

15 f. Disclosure of trade secrets or commercial or financial information that is  
16 privileged or confidential;

17 g. Disclosure of information of a personal nature where disclosure would  
18 constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;

19 h. Disclosure of investigative records compiled for law enforcement purposes;

20 i. Disclosure of information related to any investigative reports prepared by or

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PROPOSED ORDER

An order of the Occupational Therapists Affiliated Credentialing Board to **amend** ch. OT 3.06 (3), and (table), relating to continuing education.

Analysis prepared by the Department of Safety and Professional Services.

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ANALYSIS

**Statutes interpreted:**

Section 440.03 (4m), Stats.

**Statutory authority:**

Sections 15.085 (5) (b) and 448.965 (1) (b), Stats.

**Explanation of agency authority:**

Section 15.085 (5) (b), Stats., provides an affiliated credentialing board “[s]hall promulgate rules for its own guidance and for the guidance of the trade or profession to which it pertains. . .” The proposed rule will provide guidance concerning the supervision and practice of occupational therapy assistants.

Section 448.965 (1) (b), Stats., provides the Occupational Therapists Affiliated Credentialing Board may promulgate rules that establish “[c]ontinuing education requirements for license renewal for an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant under s. 448.967 (2).”

**Related statute or rule:**

None.

**Plain language analysis:**

- Section OT 3.06 (3) is revised to specify that the continuing education points obtained through means other than professional development activities in Table 3.06 should be in courses, programs, or other educational activities related to the licensee’s practice.

- Table OT 3.06 is revised to include webinars approved by the Wisconsin Occupational Therapists Association (WOTA) and/or the American Occupational Therapists Association (AOTA), initial certification in specified subjects, and specialty certifications from AOTA in the list of professional development activities for continuing education credit.

**Summary of, and comparison with, existing or proposed federal regulation:**

None.

**Comparison with rules in adjacent states:**

**Illinois:** 68 Ill. Admin. Code 1315.145 b) specifies the requirements for continuing education courses for occupational therapists to be approved. All CE activities shall be relevant to the advancement, extension, and enhancement of professional clinical skills and scientific knowledge in the practice of occupational therapy; provide experiences that contain scientific integrity, relevant subject matter and course materials; and be developed and presented by persons with education and/or experience in the subject matter. Subsection c) specifies other activities from which CE may be earned, and subsection d) names approved sponsors of CE programs.

**Iowa:** 645 IAC 207.3(1) and (2) specify general and specific criteria for approval of continuing education activities for occupational therapists. General criteria include that the program constitutes an organized program of learning which contributes directly to the professional competency of the licensee; that it pertains to subject matters which integrally relate to practice; that it is conducted by individuals who are qualified by education, training, and experience; that it fulfills stated program goals and/or objectives; and that it provides proof of attendance to licensees. Specific criteria expands into what types of activities and what subjects generally are and are not acceptable for continuing education credit.

**Michigan:** Mich Admin Code, R 338.1252 provides the requirements for acceptable continuing education for occupational therapists and occupational therapists assistants, including format and subject matter requirements. Subsection (3) provides a table of acceptable continuing education activities along with the maximum allowable hours of credit that can be completed for each activity.

**Minnesota:** The Minnesota Statutes provide standards for determining qualified continuing education activities and define activities that qualify for continuing education contact hours (Minnesota Statutes 2017, section 148.6443, Subds. 2. and 3.). To qualify for continuing education credit, an activity must constitute an organized program of learning; it must reasonably be expected to advance the knowledge and skills of the practitioner; it must pertain to subjects directly related to the practice of occupational therapy; it must be conducted by a sponsor approved by the American Occupational Therapy Association or by individuals who should be considered experts on the topic due to their education, training, and experience; and it must be presented by a sponsor who has a means to verify attendance and maintain records for three years. Subd. 3. defines acceptable means of obtaining continuing education credit through various courses and activities and the maximum allowable hours that can be obtained through any particular activity.

**Summary of factual data and analytical methodologies:**

The proposed rules were developed by reviewing the provisions of ch. OT 3 to ensure consistency with current standards for drafting style and format and applicable Wisconsin statutes.

SECTION 1. OT 3.06 (3) is amended to read:

**OT 3.06 (3)** At least 12 points of the continuing education required under subs. (1) and (2) shall be accumulated through 2 or more professional development activities listed under Table OT 3.06 that are related to occupational therapy. The remainder of the continuing education required under subs. (1) and (2) shall be accumulated through courses, programs, or other educational activities related to the licensee’s practice. In Table OT 3.06, “contact hour” means not less than 50 minutes of actual professional activity.

SECTION 2. OT 3.06 (3) (table) lines (b), (f), and (g) are amended to read:
