ADOPTING RULES

(CLEARINGHOUSE RULE 18-098)

ORDER

An order of the Marriage and Family Therapy, Professional Counseling, and Social Work Examining Board to create MPSW 1.09, relating to substance use disorder specialty authorization.

Analysis prepared by the Department of Safety and Professional Services.

ANALYSIS

Statutes interpreted: ss. 440.88 and 457.02 (5) and (5m), Stats.

Statutory authority: ss. 15.08 (5) (b) and 457.02 (5m), Stats.

Explanation of agency authority:

Each board shall promulgate rules for its own guidance and the guidance of the profession to which it pertains and define and enforce professional conduct and unethical practices not inconsistent with the law relating to the particular profession. [s. 15.08 (5) (b), Stats.]

The board establishes the educational and supervised training requirements in rules promulgated by the board to authorize an individual who is certified by the board to treat substance use disorder as a specialty. In promulgating rules under this subsection, the examining board shall consider the requirements for qualifying for a credential under s. 440.88, Stats. [s. 457.02 (5m), Stats.]

Related statute or rule: chs. SPS 160 to 168

Plain language analysis:

This rulemaking order creates the educational and supervised training requirements for a person certified by the board to treat alcohol or substance dependency as a specialty. The board utilizes the DSM V term substance use disorder rather than the previous DSM IV terms of dependence and abuse.

The first subsection delineates the use of the title and scope of practice. If a person who is certified by the board wants to treat substance use disorder as a specialty, without being credentialed under s. 440.88, Stats., the person must meet the requirements in this section.

The second subsection recognizes that a credential holder who holds an advanced practice social worker or independent social worker credential would have received education in treatment, therefore, a minimum of 135 contact hours of substance use disorder education is required to supplement that education in four subject matter areas (understanding addiction; knowledge of addiction treatment; application to addiction practice; and professional readiness in addiction treatment). The credential holder would also be required to have 200 hours of supervised face-to-face client treatment. The education could be obtained in the course of earning the master's degree or in addition to the degree. The 200 hours of supervised training may be obtained during or separately from the hours required to obtain the underlying credential.

The third subsection provides the requirements for the remaining credentials certified under ch. 457, Stats. The requirements include 180 contact hours of substance use disorder education. The education must include assessment training, counseling training, case management, patient education, professional responsibility, and boundaries and ethics. The education could be obtained in the course of earning of the bachelor's degree or in addition to the degree. In addition, the individual must complete a minimum of 1,000 hours of face-to-face substance use disorder treatment experience. The 1,000 hours of supervised training may have been obtained during or separately from the hours required to obtain the underlying credential.

The fourth subsection indicates the qualifications for a person who is supervising the person obtaining the training for the specialty. The following people are qualified, provided they have knowledge in psychopharmacology and addiction treatment: a licensed marriage and family therapist, a licensed professional counselor, a licensed clinical social worker, a licensed psychologist, a licensed physian, a clinical supervisor as defined by SPS 160.02 (7), or another individual approved in advance of the supervising by the board.

The fifth subsection indicates that at least 6 continuing education hours in substance use disorder must be obtained during each biennial credentialing period. This continuing education may be counted toward the continuing education required for the renewal of the underlying credential.

Summary of, and comparison with, existing or proposed federal regulation: None

Comparison with rules in adjacent states:

Illinois: Illinois does not have requirements for a social worker to obtain specified education or training to specialize in substance use disorder treatment.

Iowa: Iowa does not have requirements for a social worker to obtain specified education or training to specialize in substance use disorder treatment.

Michigan: Michigan does not have requirements for a social worker to obtain specified education or training to specialize in substance use disorder treatment.

Minnesota: Minnesota does not have requirements for a social worker to obtain specified education or training to specialize in substance use disorder treatment.

Summary of factual data and analytical methodologies:

The Board considered the requirements for qualifying for a credential under s. 440.88, Stats, *Scopes of Practice & Career Ladder for Substance Use Disorder Counseling* (September 2011) by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration and U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the Technical Assistance Publication Series *Addiction Counseling Competencies* (March 2008) by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration

TEXT OF RULE

SECTION 1. MPSW 1.09 is created to read:

MPSW 1.09 Substance abuse disorder specialty (1) USE OF TITLE AND SCOPE OF PRACTICE (a) A person certified by the board may use the title "alcohol and drug counselor" or "chemical dependency counselor" only if the person is credentialed as a substance abuse counselor under s. 440.88, Stats., or satisfies the educational and supervised training requirements established in this section.

(b) A person who is certified by the board may treat substance use disorder as a specialty if the person is credentialed under s. 440.88, Stats., or satisfies the educational and supervised training requirements established in this section.

- (c) A person certified by the board may do all of the following:
 - 1. Prepare a client for substance use disorder treatment by referral.
 - 2. Continue to work with the non substance use disorder issues of a person who has been referred for substance use disorder treatment.
 - 3. Continue to treat a client who is in recovery following treatment for substance use disorder.
- (2) SPECIALTY REQUIREMENTS FOR INDIVIDUALS CERTIFIED AS AN ADVANCED PRACTICE SOCIAL WORKER OR INDEPENDENT SOCIAL WORKER. To be authorized to treat substance use disorder as a specialty, an advanced practice social worker or independent social worker shall meet all of the following:
 - (a) A minimum of 135 contact hours of substance use disorder education, which may be obtained within the master's degree or additional to the master's degree. The education shall contain all of the following topics:
 - 1. Understanding addiction.
 - 2. Knowledge of addiction treatment.
 - 3. Application to addiction practice.
 - 4. Professional readiness in addiction treatment.
 - (b) A minimum of 200 hours of face-to-face client treatment with individuals diagnosed with substance use disorders, under the supervision of a qualified supervisor.
- (3) SPECIALTY REQUIREMENTS FOR INDIVIDUALS CERTIFIED BY THE BOARD OTHER THAN AS ADVANCED PRACTICE SOCIAL WORKERS OR INDEPENDENT SOCIAL WORKERS. To be authorized to treat substance use disorder as a specialty an individual certified under s. 457.08 (1), 457.09 (1) or 457.14 (1) (a), Stats., shall meet all of the following:
 - (a) A minimum of 180 contact hours of substance use disorder education, which may be obtained within the bachelor or master's degree or in addition to the bachelor or master's degree. The education shall be in all of the following:
 - 1. Thirty hours in assessment training.
 - 2. Thirty hours in counseling training.
 - 3. Thirty hours in case management.
 - 4. Thirty hours in patient education.
 - 5. Thirty hours in professional responsibility.
 - 6. Three hours in boundaries and ethics.
 - 7. Twenty-seven hours in electives in any of the subjects in subd. 1. to 6.
 - (b) A minimum of 1,000 of hours of face-to-face substance use disorder treatment experience, under the supervision of a qualified supervisor, with individuals diagnosed with substance use disorders. The supervised hours can be either the same as or separate from the hours obtained for the credential issued by the board.
- **(4)** QUALIFIED SUPERVISORS. A qualified supervisor is a person who is knowledgeable in psychopharmacology and addiction treatment and is any of the following:
 - (a) A clinical supervisor as defined by s. SPS 160.02 (7).
 - (b) A licensed marriage and family therapist.
 - (c) A licensed professional counselor.
 - (d) A licensed clinical social worker.
 - (e) A licensed psychologist.
 - (f) A licensed physician.

- (g) An individual, other than an individual specified in pars. (a) to (f) who is approved in advance by the board.
- (5) CONTINUING EDUCATION. To maintain the authority to treat substance use disorder, an individual certified by the board must complete at least 6 continuing education hours during each biennial credentialing period in substance use disorder. The continuing education may be counted toward the continuing education required for renewal of the underlying credential.

An order of the Marriage and Family Therapy, Professional Counseling, and Social Work Examining Board to repeal and recreate MPSW 16.02, and to amend 16.04 (1) relating to education equivalent to a graduate degree in marriage and family therapy from a program accredited by COAMFTE.

ANALYSIS

Statutes interpreted: Section 457.03 (1), Stats.

Statutory authority: Sections 15.08 (5) (b) and 457.03 (1), Stats.

Explanation of agency authority:

"Each examining board [s]hall promulgate rules for its own guidance and for the guidance of the trade or profession to which it pertains, and define and enforce professional conduct and unethical practices not inconsistent with the law relating to the particular trade or profession." [s. 15.08 (5) (b), Stats.]

"Upon the advice of the social worker section, marriage and family therapist section, and professional counselor section, promulgate rules establishing minimum standards for educational programs that must be completed for certification or licensure under this chapter and for supervised clinical training that must be completed for licensure as a clinical social worker, marriage and family therapist, or professional counselor under this chapter and approve educational programs and supervised clinical training programs in accordance with those standards." [s. 457.03 (1), Stats.]

Related statute or rule: None.

Plain language analysis:

The rule clarifies that courses taken outside of the program study leading to a master's or doctorate degree are acceptable to obtain program equivalency, and that individuals may begin to accrue clinical practice hours upon completion of a graduate degree in a mental health field approved by the marriage and family therapist section, and enrollment in a graduate degree program or other educational program in marriage and family therapy accredited by COAMFTE.

Summary of, and comparison with, existing or proposed federal regulation: None.

Summary of public comments received on statement of scope and a description of how and to what extent those comments and feedback were taken into account in drafting the proposed rule:

The Board held a preliminary hearing on the statement of scope for this rule at its March 18, 2019 meeting. No comments were received.

Comparison with rules in adjacent states:

Illinois: According to Illinois Admin Code s. 1283.30 (e), courses taken at a post-degree institution may count as equivalent for an education requirement if the institution's training program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Marriage and Family Therapy Education (COAMFTE), or meets the following requirements:

- 1) The institution's program is established to achieve coherent mission and training objectives and the program has as its primary objective the training of marriage and family therapists.
- 2) The specific course submitted as equivalent to those defined in subsection (b) is taught by faculty who hold graduate degrees and are trained and credentialed in the field in which they teach.
- 3) Courses must be offered by an established, identifiable facility or agency.
- 4) Courses must be ongoing and additive (offered at the same place over a specific period of time and available on an ongoing basis) or offered off site by an acceptable post degree institution with an established, identifiable home-base facility or agency.
- 5) Courses must include outlines, clear description of content, appropriate bibliography, and other indications or meet generally acceptable criteria for academic offerings.
- 6) Correspondence courses are not acceptable.

Iowa: According to IAC 645—31.4(2), an applicant can attain licensure as a marriage and family therapist with a master's degree in a counseling related field, and various semester hours of required coursework documented on the applicant's graduate

transcript

Michigan: Michigan Admin Code R 338.7205 (a) (ii) allows an individual to complete graduate level courses outside of the master's or higher graduate degree attained in order to meet educational requirements for licensure as a marriage and family therapist.

Minnesota: Minnesota code requires a graduate degree in a subject field related to marriage and family therapy, and the degree program must contain the required coursework enumerated in the rule. Minn. Admin Code 5300.0140 (2).

Summary of factual data and analytical methodologies:

The Board determined that it was necessary to clarify that courses taken outside of a degree program can count towards the academic program equivalent to a master's or doctorate degree in marriage and family therapy to prevent confusion and barriers to entry to the profession.

The rule was posted for 14 days to receive economic comments. No comments were received.

- (1) Course work required for education to be substantially equivalent to the course work required for a master's or doctorate degree in marriage and family therapy course work from a program accredited by COAMFTE shall contain all of the following:
- (a) At least 6 semester credits or 8 quarter credits in the area of foundations of relational or systemic practice, theories and models.
- **(b)** At least 6 semester credits or 8 quarter credits in the area of clinical treatment with individuals, couples and families. This area shall include a focus on evidence based practice and content on crisis intervention.
- (c) At least 3 semester credits or 4 quarter credits in the area of diverse, multicultural or underserved communities. This area shall include understanding and applying knowledge of diversity, power, privilege, or oppression.
- (d) At least 3 semester credits or 4 quarter credits in the area of research and evaluation. This area shall include marriage and family therapy research and evaluation methods and evidence based practice.
- (e) At least 3 semester credits or 4 quarter credits in the area of professional identity, federal and state law, ethics, and social responsibility.
- (f) At least 3 semester credits or 4 quarter credits in the area of biopsychosocial health and development across the life span.
- (g) At least 3 semester credits or 4 quarter credits in the area of systemic assessment and mental health diagnosis and treatment.
- (h) At least 3 semester credits or 4 quarter credits in the area of contemporary developments which interface marriage and family therapy knowledge and practice with the broader multidisciplinary context.
- (i) A clinical internship as part of an academic program in marriage and family therapy or a substantially equivalent field. The internship shall consist of a minimum of 300 hours in face—to—face contact with individuals, couples, and families for the purpose of assessment, diagnosis, and treatment under supervision in not less than 8 calendar months.
- (2) An applicant may, at an institution which was accredited by its regional accrediting association at the time the course was completed, complete credit hours outside the program of studies leading to a master's or doctorate degree in order to meet the requirements in this section.
- (3) An applicant may, at an institute for marriage and family therapy which was accredited by COAMFTE at the time the course was completed, complete credit hours outside of a program of studies leading to a master's or doctorate degree in order to meet the requirements in this section.

SECTION 2. MPSW 16.04 (1) is amended to read:

MPSW 16.04 (1) An applicant for licensure as a marriage and family therapist under s. 457.10, Stats., shall complete, after receiving the required master's or doctorate degree, or upon completion of a graduate degree in a mental health field approved by the marriage and family therapist section, and enrollment in a graduate degree program or other

educational program in marriage and family therapy accredited by COAMFTE, 3,000 hours of supervised marriage and family therapy practice, including at least 1,000 hours of face—to—face client contact, while holding a valid marriage and family therapist training license before being eligible for licensure.

ANALYSIS

Statutes interpreted: ss. 111.321, 111.322, and 111.335, Stats.

Statutory authority: ss. 15.08 (5) (b) and 227.11 (2) (a), Stats.

Explanation of agency authority:

"Each examining board [s]hall promulgate rules for its own guidance and for the guidance of the trade or profession to which it pertains, and define and enforce professional conduct and unethical practices not inconsistent with the law relating to the particular trade or profession." [s. 15.08 (5) (b), Stats.]

"Each agency may promulgate rules interpreting the provisions of any statute enforced or administered by the agency, if the agency considers it necessary to effectuate the purpose of the statute..." [s. 227.11 (2) (a), Stats.]

Related statute or rule: None.

Plain language analysis:

2017 Wisconsin Act 278 enacted statutory changes to ch. 111, Stats., prohibiting a licensing agency from refusing to license an individual, or suspending a license, on the basis of a substantially related pending criminal charge, unless the charge is for one of certain specified crimes against a child or life and bodily security, or a violent crime against a child.

This rule project revises the MPSW code pertaining to applications in order to clarify that applicants are required to submit documentation of their conviction record, and are only required to submit documentation of a pending charge if it is necessary for the board to determine whether the pending charge substantially related and it involves a crime against a child or life and bodily security, or a violent crime against a child, as defined in s. 111.335, Stats.

Summary of public comments received on statement of scope and a description of how and to what extent those comments and feedback were taken into account in drafting the proposed rule:

The MPSW board held a preliminary hearing on the statement of scope at its March 18, 2019 meeting. No comments were received.

Summary of, and comparison with, existing or proposed federal regulation: None.

Comparison with rules in adjacent states:

Illinois: Marriage and family therapists, social workers, and professional counselors are regulated by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation.

The rules of professional conduct for marriage and family therapists provide that a therapist convicted of any crime, or who engages in conduct which could lead to a conviction, related to the therapist's qualifications or professional responsibilities may be subject to disciplinary action. (s. 1283.100 Professional Conduct).

The rules of professional conduct for social workers provide that the division may revoke, refuse to issue, or renew a license or take other disciplinary action if a social worker providing services or supervising services commits any dishonest, corrupt, or fraudulent act that is substantially related to the social worker's functions or duties. (s. 1470.96 Unethical, Unauthorized, and Unprofessional Conduct).

The Department of Financial and Professional Regulation code does not provide for disciplinary action against professional counselors who face charges or have a conviction record.

Iowa: The Board of Behavioral Science within the Iowa Department of Public Health regulates marital and family therapists and mental health counselors. Marital and family therapists and mental health counselors may be disciplined if convicted of a crime related to the profession, or a crime that would affect the ability to practice within the profession (Iowa Administrative Code s. 645.33.2). There is no provision in the rules to discipline a licensee who merely has a pending charge.

The Board of Social Work within the Iowa Department of Public Health regulates social workers. Social workers may be disciplined if convicted of a crime related to the

profession, or a crime that would affect the ability to practice within the profession (Iowa Administrative Code s. 645.283.2). There is no provision in the rules to discipline a licensee who merely has a pending charge.

Michigan: The Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs regulates marriage and family therapists, professional counselors, and social workers. Individuals licensed under the Michigan Public Health Code (including marriage and family therapists, professional counselors, and social workers) must be "of good moral character." (MCL 333.16174 (1) (b)). The agency may consider a judgment of guilt in a criminal prosecution or a judgment in a civil action in determining whether an individual is of good moral character. The individual can provide evidence showing that they are of good moral character to rebut a previous criminal or civil judgment (MCL 338.42).

Minnesota: The Minnesota Marriage and Family Therapy Board regulates marriage and family therapists. The board may suspend, revoke, condition, limit, qualify, or restrict a license if the individual is convicted of a crime that renders the person unfit to practice marriage and family therapy. These crimes are enumerated in 5300.0330 Sup. 2 of the Minnesota Administrative Rules.

The Minnesota Board of Behavioral Health and Therapy regulates professional counselors. A professional counselor may not violate any law in which the facts giving rise to the violation involve the practice of professional counseling.

The Minnesota Board of Social Work regulates social workers. The Board's rules have all been repealed and codified into statute. Section 148E.210 of the Minnesota Statutes provides that the board may take action against a social worker who "engages in acts or conduct adversely affecting the applicant or licensee's current ability or fitness to engage in social work practice, whether or not the acts or conduct occurred while engaged in the practice of social work."

Summary of factual data and analytical methodologies:

The MPSW board reviewed and seeks to revise its rules to bring them into compliance with the statutory changes enacted by 2017 Wisconsin Act 278.
